

Jess Asato MP celebrates 'fantastic day for Lowestoft, Beccles, and the surrounding villages' following Labour Government's green light for the James Paget Hospital rebuild.

Following the publication of the Labour Government's review of the New Hospital Programme yesterday, funding has been confirmed and a green light given for the James Paget Hospital rebuild. Jess Asato MP described the scheme as 'desperately needed' and said that 'after years of false hope, residents in Lowestoft, Beccles, and the surrounding villages will today breathe a sigh of relief that we finally have a timetable for delivery thanks to Labour.'

There had previously been years of uncertainty as to whether the scheme would go ahead. The New Hospitals Programme, announced by Boris Johnson in 2020, promised '40 new hospitals' but was delayed by years and not a single new hospital had been constructed by the time the Conservatives left office. Upon coming into power, Labour found that the funding for the programme was shockingly due to run out in March 2025. A review of the programme was announced after the election in order to provide a realistic and affordable timetable for delivery and to give patients an honest, realistic, deliverable timetable that they can believe in.

The outcome of that review was announced Monday 20th January, and the New Hospitals Programme has now been put on a sustainable footing, with a timeline that can be met, and a budget that is consistent with the fiscal rules that the Labour Government is operating under. James Paget Hospital will be part of the first wave of hospitals to be rebuilt, with construction set to begin in 2027-28. The project will prioritise replacing the most affected RAAC-constructed buildings first, followed by other areas of the hospital that remain operational. Key enabling works will include a new multi-storey car park, the relocation of the hospital helipad and solar farm, as well as improvements to utility infrastructure.

Jess Asato MP said: "I am absolutely delighted. This is the news that residents in Lowestoft, Beccles, and the surrounding villages have been waiting to hear for far too long. For years we have been led up the garden path with false promises from the Tories about when this desperately needed scheme will finally be underway in our community. The James Paget Hospital is a vital lifeline for our local communities, providing essential healthcare services to thousands of people. Ensuring its facilities are safe and fit for the future is paramount, and I am proud to have fought for this outcome. It is thanks to this Labour Government that we now have a timetable for delivery, so patients finally get the care they deserve."

Wes Streeting, Labour's Secretary of State for Health and Social Care said: "Since the election, Jess Asato has been banging the drum day and night for the James Paget Hospital rebuild. The New Hospital Programme we inherited was unfunded and undeliverable. Not a single new hospital was built in the past five years, and there was no credible plan to build forty in the next five years. When I walked into the Department of Health and Social Care, I was told that the funding for the New Hospitals Programme runs out in March. We were determined to put the programme on a firm footing, so we can build the new hospitals our NHS needs. We are setting out an honest, funded, and deliverable programme to rebuild our NHS. I am committed to delivering the James Paget Hospital rebuild and to rebuilding our NHS."





MP demands 'best start in life' for children on School visit

Families in Lowestoft, Beccles and the Villages will soon be able to access quality before-school childcare as Labour pushes ahead with its Children's Wellbeing & Schools Bill to roll out free breakfast clubs across the country. Jess Asato MP recently visited Northfield St Nicholas Primary Academy to demand that children in Lowestoft, Beccles and the Villages get the 'best start in life.' During her visit to the school's breakfast club, led by 'Magic Breakfast' and school staff, Jess Asato gathered evidence on how the Labour government's plan to roll out free breakfast clubs for primary school children could transform the lives of families in the area.

New research has revealed that thousands of primary school children in Lowestoft, Beccles and the Villages could benefit from free breakfast clubs, boosting their attendance, attainment, readiness to learn, wellbeing, and behaviour. These clubs will also help parents work the jobs and hours they choose, saving them money on childcare and reducing the constraints of school drop-offs.

During her visit, Jess Asato heard from staff and families about the difference a free breakfast club makes to children's daily experience at school, improving their focus and confidence. The MP's intervention follows the Second Reading of Labour's Children's Wellbeing & Schools Bill, a landmark piece of legislation designed to ensure children and families have access to a free breakfast club at their local primary school. The Labour government kick-started the programme with an early adopter scheme, opening applications in November 2024, with a wider rollout beginning in April 2025. Funding for the programme was secured in Labour's Budget, tripling investment in breakfast clubs to over £33 million.

The breakfast clubs are a key part of Labour's mission to break the unfair link between background and opportunity. The Plan for Change sets tangible targets to make a difference to the lives of working people, with the Opportunity Mission focused on ensuring children have 'the best start in life.' Labour is committed to achieving record numbers of school-ready children, focusing on personal, social, physical development, communication, literacy, and maths.

Education Secretary Bridget Phillipson said: "Breakfast clubs boost parents' work choices as well as children's life chances. They are integral to this government's mission to break down the barriers to opportunity, so where you come from doesn't determine where you end up in life. From helping with flexible working for families to improving behaviour and attendance, the supportive start to the day that breakfast clubs provide will help drive high and rising standards for every child. This Labour government has a Plan for Change that will give children growing up in our country the best start in life."

Jess Asato, MP for Lowestoft, said: "Through my recent visit to Northfield St Nicholas Primary Academy, I've seen firsthand how valuable breakfast clubs will be for families in Lowestoft, Beccles and the Villages, boosting attendance and attainment while helping parents save money. That's why it's a shame these clubs were only available in one in ten schools under the Conservatives. Labour will make them available to every child. It's clear to see that this is a child-centred Labour government, determined to give children in Lowestoft, Beccles and the Villages the best start in life."



The Labour government's wider funded wraparound childcare offer – for all primary children to be able to access childcare between 8am-6pm – continues to roll out across the country. Labour is also developing an ambitious strategy to reduce child poverty and give children the best start in life, which will be published in Spring 2025. The Taskforce, led by the Work and Pensions Secretary and Education Secretary, is exploring all available levers across government to drive forward both short-term and long-term actions to reduce child poverty.

Thermal Imaging Project:

This free of charge project is to assist Kessingland residents in seeing where there is heat loss from their homes, how that may be reduced and what grants and funding may be available. Reducing heat loss can lead to lower energy use & costs as well as cutting carbon emissions.

Volunteers in the group have completed their training sessions and are due to start carrying out some trials with a thermal imaging camera.

We hope to be able to offer thermal imaging of homes in February/March 2025.
